After gathering for some fellowship and a quick bite in the Atrium area, the Lodge members and guests moved into the dining area. We are what we sow...

What constitutes an Odd Fellows Lodge? What differentiates us from a club or other social grouping? For one, our basic mandates which were the basis of our beginnings. Did you know, for example, that there are strict legal requirements to which we must adhere to be classified as a tax-exempt organization? The IRS statements, quoted verbatim, are below.

A mutual benefit corporation stands apart from the other types of non profits because its mission is to serve its members and not the public. Common examples of mutual benefit corporations are homeowners' associations, chambers of commerce, fraternities, and professional associations. - Wikipedia

To be exempt under Internal Revenue Code (IRC) section 501(c)(8), a fraternal beneficiary society, order, or association must meet the following requirements:

1. It must have a fraternal purpose. An organization has a fraternal purpose if membership is based on a common tie or the pursuit of a common object The organization must also have a substantial program of fraternal activities.

2. It must operate under the lodge system or for the exclusive benefit of the members of a fraternal organization itself operating under the lodge system. Operating under the lodge system requires, at a minimum, two active entities: (i) a parent organization; and (ii) a subordinate (called a lodge, branch, or the like) chartered by the parent and largely self-governing.

3. It must provide for the payment of life, sick, accident, or other benefits to the members of such society, order, or association or their dependents.

4. An organization that provides benefits to some, but not all, of its members may qualify for exemption so long as most of the members are eligible for benefits, and criteria for excluding certain members are reasonable. -Internal Revenue Service There is often discussion when a member receives either reimbursement for an event, mileage, or other payment from the order. Yet this is specifically how our order was originally based. To assume that all members exist to travel hundreds of miles free of charge at their own expense shows: (a) the order does not care for this specific member, (b) they have forgotten or muddled the original purpose of the order, or (c) no longer have the proper funds to care for their own members.

Of course, there are other circumstances. In today's world, everything seems expensive. Yet, if our financial decision is to neglect members or only to help selected members, then we seem to be ignoring our more significant responsibilities. Historically, we can be reminded of the mandates of educating the orphan, feeding the hungry, burying the dead, and other age-old charitable functions. We can no longer do things such as this in their entirety. Our order also used to do other things to aid members. For example, if a member were out of work, the lodge would attempt to find them work. If a member was traveling, arrangements were often made where a member could visit, or even spend the night, at another member's residence.

I believe this is one of the many reasons our order is quickly failing. We have members who believe that no one, often besides themselves, receives compensation for any work done in the order, travel, or other effort made. We have ceased to become an outlet for members altogether. For some reason, we have decided to question every payment a member receives. If a lodge employs a member, not only do we question their competence, but we also question payment altogether. But this is wrong and short sighted. We are losing members steadily. We in California are large enough that it is not readily apparent, but as shown by Sovereign Grand Lodge's annual reports, our numbers are quickly failing. Many states are now below 200 members statewide. Yet, supposedly, we are all religious and want to help one another. Either we react by treating our members like human beings, or we will end pretty quickly.

The Importance of Preserving a Lodge's History

Preserving a lodge's history simply allows members to learn about their lodge and about the Order. The Odd Fellows have a long, yet storied history, involving many changes, not to mention the possible figureheads.

Taking the time to open up the cabinets, closets and drawers, as well as climbing into the attic or stepping down into the basement, this is where the treasure hunts begins. Members should have access to any of these spaces as long as the activity does not interfere with the business of the lodge.

Look through old documents, folders, books, and boxes. Are there letters sent from other lodges? Are there letters signed by the town's leaders from the 1800's? Any famous or recognizable figures included in the documents? Are there any decorative letterhead by local businesses? Keep in mind multi-colored documents have significant value as the printing methods of the past are more desirable by collectors.

Open an old book. You may find an old monetary note or postage stamp between the pages. You may find an old deed or stock certificate or bond note. Old photographs are conduit to your lodge's past and perhaps progression. You may locate a old photograph of a historic event, or famous or infamous person!

Of course, your search of historic items is the first step in creating a history for your lodge members to learn from and to peruse at its leisure. The second step is preserving the history of your lodge. Preservation is keeping those items and documents protected from harm or disintegration.

You may find stacks of documents rolled up in tight bundles, as was often done in the late 1800's and early 1900's. You may even see photographs rolled up. Do not try to unravel. You want to keep them from being damaged. There is a hydration method used by members of the California Odd Fellows Historical Committee that can be accessed by contacted the Chairperson. The hydration method places the water back into the document or photograph and allows the same to be unfurled and then flattened. Then, these things may be placed into either acid-free paper-lined containers or plastic sleeves and then into binders.

Enjoy the hunt - who knows what you just might find!

Dear Dedicated Members for Change,

I have been publishing this DMC Newsletter since 2010 - the goal being to give members and Lodges ideas to sustain and increase membership. In this regard I receive emails on a fairly regular basis from Lodge members throughout North America and other countries, asking what can be done to bring in new members and to retain existing members in our Odd Fellows Lodges. Of course, as society and as generations change, this is a multi-faceted and complex question - and there is no one silver bullet. Obviously, the Lodge has to be place where friendship, love, and truth is not only mouthed, but practiced, in all things. Just as obviously, the Lodge must be a welcoming place - clean, in repair, updated, and comfortable. Attention to our rules and rituals is fundamental - it is, ultimately, what makes us Odd Fellows (rather than Masons, Elks, Eagles or Moose).

But I think that just as important is the desire to have fun. If we just sit around reading words from books, we would probably derive more benefit in a church, temple or mosque. The social aspects of a Lodge are as important as anything we do. After all, if we're not having a good time in the Lodge, why do it? And I guarantee you that the younger generation members that Lodges covet are not going to join (or continue to stay in) a boring Lodge. They want to enjoy the fraternal experience. And they should. When Odd Fellowship was founded, one of the first things members did was meet in pubs for meals, drink, conversation, and good social times. It worked then. Why should it be any different now?

So how do Lodges emphasize the fun? Well, you can let your imagination run free. It could be sponsoring game night at the Lodge, or a poker tournament, music at the Lodge, hiking, movie night, visits to other Lodges, wine tasting trips, pot lucks, etc.

When Lodge leaders and members ask for suggestions, I often say, "have fun with our Oddness". This can be done in many ways.

For example, start your meetings at 7:31 p.m. rather than 7:30 p.m. Start your breakfast at 8:01 am, rather than 8:00 a.m. Schedule an event at 6:29 p.m. rather than 6:30 p.m.

Think about events that might be "odd". Instead of an OktoberFest, how about an OddtoberFest? How about showing some movies at the Lodge with titles like "The Odd Couple" or "Odd Thomas" or "Against All Odds." If you wish to create a newsletter for the Lodge, how about giving it an "odd" name like "Odds & Ends" or "Odd News" or "The Odd Newsletter." If you create a web page or an email link to help members, don't just call it "The Bulletin Board" - instead how about naming it the "Odd Bulletin Board."

Have some fun with "oddness".

Live Degrees, For a Living Order

SARATOGA - Think back to your first experience receiving the initiatory degree. Was it mysterious? A little frightening? Did you get the sense that something dreadful, but somehow important, was about to be imparted to you? Did it feel like you were entering an ancient order with hidden knowledge and wisdom that you were about to learn? Or did you watch an hour long video of men in robes recite a lot of monologues at you?

For me, I had the first experience, and I will never forget it. But my wife joined during COVID, and we had no way to give her that experience, so she got the DVD. It was boring, but she wanted to do Odd Fellows with me, and that was the only way she could join at the time. It was adequate, but it wasn't special.

I'm a huge believer in the value of conferring our degrees live, with full props and costumes. And I know how hard it can be, especially for lodges without enough members to put together a degree team, or when they don't have access to the props already. If the only way to confer a degree is with a video, or by giving the lecture form (for those that have one), some degree is better than none. But not by much.

The Time and Effort IS the Value. Putting time and effort into something makes it valuable, because it proves that we value it so much that we're willing to spend our precious time and effort. It's circular, but it's true. And candidates get that. They know the difference between a pre-packaged experience and one that is lovingly tailored just for them. Doing the degrees, in full, is how we tell candidates how much we value them, and how much we value the lessons we have to teach.

The DVD's are actually very well done, but the experience is not special. The lesson isn't imparted as a conversation. The Vice Grand in a recording doesn't wait to hear whether the candidate has actually taken the obligation before the degree proceeds. If we won't demonstrate that we think the lesson is valuable enough to give it properly, we can't be surprised when the member doesn't find the lesson valuable either (or even remember it).

It Doesn't Have to be Perfect. The occasional thespian may join a lodge, but most of the time, everyone's an amateur. But so were most

of the Odd Fellows who went before us, and that's okay. If you practice your part enough that the candidate can hear you clearly, and you know when to speak and when to stop, then trust that the words themselves are capable of doing the work.

I started thinking about this topic last weekend when I was one of the candidates taking the Encampment degrees live at Hahn Farm in Oregon. The people putting on the degrees weren't all perfectly polished, and there was the occasional stumble over a line. They were reading from scripts most of the time.

What I experienced that day was genuine love for the Encampment, and the willingness to come together (a long journey for many of the participants) and teach lessons that have been passed down, unbroken, for the better part of two hundred years.

Could it have been done better? Of course! But will I ever forget the experience? I doubt it. Because while I was listening to the words and following the actions of the degree ceremonies, my mind was filling in the detail, connecting the words with the principles, and recognizing the common thread that unites every member of each of the degrees I experienced.

The Shared Experience is the Point. As Odd Fellows, we accept people who come from all backgrounds, classes, professions, races, geographical areas, religions, and so on. To make it work, we need to have something that unites us that we're all willing to agree is more important than our differences. Odd Fellowship is all about recognizing that we are all brothers and sisters, and that it's our duty to care for each other as fellow-siblings, looking past the false distinctions that others see.

Part of the way we learn to look past those false distinctions is by having that experience of joining the Order, and then each degree we take. If I go to another part of the world, and there's an Odd Fellows lodge, even if I don't speak the language or know the customs, I know we share a set of values. And hopefully, we've shared the same experiences partaking in the live degrees. That is a starting point on our journey to viewing one another as family, and the more we can share through our rituals and degree work, the more of a common foundation we have to build on.

What We Teach, We Also Learn. The last reason I love the live degrees isn't for the value they confer to the candidates, as much as to the

instructors. If the only experience you had with the degrees is when you received them as a new member, and now it's 30 years later, that's a lot of time to forget what your lodge taught you. When we stop doing the live degrees, we forget what they mean.

I think every member should either confer, or spectate, all of our degrees on a semi-regular basis. Especially with the initiatory, there's something powerful about watching someone go through it for the first time. There's that moment of surprise that will hopefully start them down the journey of Odd Fellowship, and seeing it in others helps us remember why it is that we're all doing this.

If your lodge isn't doing the live degrees, form a degree team. If you have to double up on parts, do that. And when it comes to the initiatory degree in particular, Sovereign Grand Lodge has approved a live form that teaches all of the lessons of that degree with only 5 roles, so contact your grand secretary if you need that degree script. Ask for the 2017 short form, known as the Feast of Odd Fellowship.

If you need to read from the book, do your best to speak clearly and read. If you don't have all of the props, do what our forebears did and make some (or partner with another lodge that has them). The point here is just that you should try. It's worth the effort.

If you have candidates for the degrees, that's wonderful! It means that your lodge has already done the work that it takes to attract new members and help them to advance. You should keep doing it! But the work of putting on the live degrees is a huge part of what it takes to turn them into Odd Fellows. It proves that you value them, and you value our teachings, and it passes those teachings along in a meaningful way they won't easily forget.
